MINUTES

CALL TO ORDER: Council President Howell called the meeting to order at 5:37PM.

FLAG SALUTE: Mayor Horton led the Flag Salute.

STATEMENT OF THE SUNSHINE LAW & NOTIFICATION THAT THIS MEETING IS ELECTRONICALLY RECORDED: Council President Howell read.

PRESENTATION – ABSECON AMERICAN LEGION POST 28: Commander Kevin Siedlek expressed his appreciation for the community and their support for the Veterans. Many local businesses have been helpful, he thanked and Recognized these businesses. Chief Laughlin: Provided background about the recent Sergeant promotion process, and read a brief bio for each candidate

Sergeant Daniel Krause

Sergeant Ryan O'Connell

Ryan O'Connell joined the Absecon Police Department in 2011, and has since held many important positions, including field training supervisor, fire arms instructor, crash reconstruction investigator, etc., and has been instrumental in Department advancements. For his swearing in, he is joined by his parents, brother, and sister. Also in attendance is Ryan's Uncle, Longport Police Chief Frank Culmone, who will be pinning Ryan's badge. For his Oath, Ryan's wife, Samantha, will be holding the Bible.

2022 ORDINANCES FOR ADOPTION

- 06** Amending the City of Absecon Code, Chapter 118 – Alcoholic Beverage Control, Section 16 – Hours.

All were in favor.

Jim Falivene – Owner of the Black Cat - Expressed his opposition to this ordinance. He has been involved in this matter for about 3 ½ years. He does not believe this is a Public Safety issue, but rather an issue with the extreme amount of trouble from the bar across the street for many years. The City has put Absecon businesses in a bad position. Issues at the other bar have extended onto the Black Cat property, increasing their own liability. He's been in continuous communication with the Absecon Police Dept. and has provided them video footage of incidents. He has been extremely concerned about his liability and believed the City needed to intervene, however nothing was done until the NJ ABC came in and swiftly solved the problem. If the Hi Point Pub is re-opened, the City

must address the issues just as quickly. 71% of the calls to Police regarding the Hi Point Pub in the past year, were placed before 2:00AM, so even if the ordinance is enacted, the problem still exists. Falivene and John Rifici have both been in business for over 40 years and have not caused the City any problems. He proposes that the City should let the "immediate future" guide their decision about whether to change the ordinance. Falivene and Rifici's businesses all close "long before" 2:00AM and are not the subject of any violent late-night calls to the police. If there is a troublesome business in Absecon, the City should address the issues with that specific business and not punish the other law-abiding businesses.

Thomas Marrone – 1104 Spring Lane: Echoed what Jim Falivene stated. He believes Falivene provided great options to improve the situation. The people affected by this ordinance (Falivene & Rifici) are great business owners and deserve more time to prove the bar hours aren't an issue. If this ordinance passes, he's assuming liquor licenses lose value, which is essentially money coming out of the bar owner's pockets. They are active and helpful members of the community and they are being punished for something they didn't do. Public safety is an important issue, but if police calls are significantly reduced, then there is no urgency in passing this ordinance right now. Our police department is one of the best in the state of NJ, maybe even the country, and the current Chief is the best Absecon has ever had. However, Absecon's police force is spread thin and he believes we need to hire more officers.

Jeannine Wescoat – 115 Kessler Lane – Real Estate Agent at 410 New Jersey Avenue: Wants to present information about ordinance from a business perspective. When Skelly owned the High Point Pub, it was a place locals enjoyed, but with new ownership, there seems to be a new crowd. Wescoat agrees with Falivene and Marrone that things should have been handled differently. She believes this ordinance will significantly devalue the existing bar's liquor license and the City overall. Wescoat proposes a strategic planning meeting with the Council and members of the community to help improve local business. She also requested that Council President Howell abstain from voting because she worked for "that man" for a long time.

Mike Reilly – 444 4th Street: Has worked all shifts throughout his career. There are very few options for a 24-hour bar or just places for people to go after work. Although I think the people before me presented good issues, Reilly urged the Council to also consider his input also.

William Link – 317 W. Church Street: Opposes the idea of closing the bars in Absecon at 2:00AM, because of the outcome of things with the Hi Point. By devaluing the liquor licenses in Absecon, the City is hurting current local business and deterring potential local business. Absecon's proximity to Atlantic City incentivizes bars to stay open late hours. This ordinance should never be passed. The people responsible for the bar are the owners and management.

Rich DeRose – 43 Natalie Terrace: In the research he's conducted, he has come upon instances in which NJ municipalities have taken action to close certain bars down. There are things the community and the City, as a governing body, could have done to stop Hi Point Pub, without attacking good legitimate businesses. Public safety is a very serious matter and it has been ignored for two years. Suggests the matter is tabled again in order to have more conversations. If issues arise again, there are mechanisms in place that could offer solutions.

S. Cain: Before voting, Cain expressed how difficult this matter has been for everyone. She personally likes the Black Cat and Rifici's, as well as their owners, however, the Council must consider the entire City when making their decision. The Council members have been elected and are trusted by the community to make these difficult decisions. She indicated that she was sorry that certain bar owners feel the way they do. Cain was on the committee that further investigated the issue of bar hours, along with other Council Members, which met with bar owners. During the meetings Councilman LaRotonda proposed a compromise of maybe closing at 3:00AM instead of 2:00AM, however the owners, unfortunately, were unwilling to consider any compromise.

N. LaRotonda: Believes this ordinance is about bad bar owners. There are mechanisms in place to hold irresponsible bar owners accountable. All this ordinance will do is hurt responsible bar owners.

This ordinance has been heard and is finally approved.

87 Approving the insertion of a Special Item of Revenue into the 2022 Municipal Budget to allow for the receipt of \$21,213.84 from the State of New Jersey Clean Communities.

J. Thompson: This is a grant we received, which we get each year.

88 Authorizing Municipal support for Public Absecon, Inc. to receive a Class 5 Retail Cannabis License from the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory Commission to operate within the City of Absecon

PUBLIC PORTION – (For Agenda items only)

Motioned to open to the public: Councilman Cavileer; Seconded: Councilwoman Poley
All were in favor.

W. Link – 317 W. Church Street (#88): The possession of “marijuana” is still against federal law, despite what the governor and the state legislature have decided. The Council is therefore denying federal law and breaking the Oaths you took. According to Police Officers, they still haven’t figured out how to technically determine someone is high on cannabis. This makes it a public safety issue.

Chris Seher – 707 Chelsea Road (#88): Asks how many “marijuana” retailers the City has supported so far and how many they intend to support. Also wants to know if City has conducted any background checks of potential business owners.

J. Thompson: There is a Cannabis committee which has met several times. This is the second cannabis retail business we are supporting. When a retailer submits their application, they meet with the committee so they can ask the retailer questions, and then determine if they would fit well into the community. This is the second retailer of three the City will be supporting. The maximum number of retailers the City accepts is three.

C. Seher: Heard the three retailers endorsed by the City are first come first serve.

Council President Howell: Informed Seher that he heard wrong. The committee investigates everyone who applies and determines who is best for the community.

J. Thompson: So far, the City has received four applications, but the City is in communication with several other interested businesses.

C. Seher: So, four have applied, but the City only accepted two. If only two have received City endorsement, does that mean the other two have not?

J. Thompson: The committee is still conducting investigations and interviews.

C. Seher: Are the businesses showing the committee presentations? Is the Police Dept. doing background checks?

Council President Howell: Yes, the retailers have shown the Committee presentations. The companies come in with many people, including their lawyers and security personnel. These companies also have credible experience.

B. Blaney: Background checks are part of the state process. In order to get into the state process, the retail company needs an endorsement from the City. Then, the retail company must go through the state process. The state then accepts or rejects, there is no guarantee the business will open just because the City passes an ordinance stating their support.

C. Seher: Where is the retailer’s site?

Council President Howell: Sack o’ Subs’ location. The owner of the property has also accompanied our meetings with the potential retailer.

M. Reilly – 444 4th Street (#88): In favor of the Cannabis resolution. It could generate enormous tax income which the City needs. It’s going to be available almost everywhere in the future, might as well get a jump on it now.

REPORTS

D. Poley – Community Affairs: The Community Affairs Committee met earlier that day. The Tour de Lights on May 20th was very successful and very well attended. May 30th, Memorial Day, was also a success. Nice to know we have such a patriotic town. The Memorial Day Parade was the largest parade the City has had so far and there was a wonderful ceremony at Veteran's Park. Thanks to the VFW, American Legion, the Last Salute, Absecon Community Affairs, and of course the members of the community as well. June 11th will be Hooked on Fishing with the Absecon Police Dept. and the City-Wide Yard Sale. Information is available at the Absecon Community Affairs Facebook Page. July 8th at 7:30PM the Absecon Police Dept. is having a Christmas in July Movie Night (How the Grinch Stole Christmas) at Heritage Park. The committee is trying to plan a Cookie and Coffee with a Cop event sometime in August. Creekfest will be on September 18th. Next Community Affairs Committee meeting will be on the first Thursday in July.

S. Cain – Public Safety: The Public Safety Committee has not met since the last Council Meeting. Their next meeting will be on June 6th at 4:30PM in the Municipal Complex.

Chief Laughlin – Police: The Police have put the speed signs out in the City and have been giving out tickets to speeding drivers. The Chief encourages everyone to lock their car doors. Due to recent increase of car burglaries. Residents are also encouraged to lock their sheds. The Chief recommends residents acquire good lighting to deter people from trying to break into their property. Also, the Chief encourages residents to call the Police Dept. if they see anything suspicious (including on the bike path, park, etc.). He assures the public that their calls are not considered a bother, and that they will gladly take any calls of concern. The Chief concluded by thanking the men and women of the Absecon Police Dept. for their hard work recently.

C. Cavileer – Finance: The Finance Committee hasn't met since the last Council Meeting. Encouraged the community to attend the Absecon American Legion Post 28 Clam Bake coming up. People can go to any American Legion Auxiliary Member to purchase a ticket.

B. Burroughs – Public Works: The Public Works Committee has not met since the last Council Meeting, but their next meeting will be June 21st.

N. LaRotonda – Economic Development: No report.

J. Thompson: Concerts in the Park will begin June 26th, and they will be every Sunday at 7:00PM (last concert will begin at 4:00PM). The City will have 9 concerts all together. Trash containers are scheduled to be rolled out week of June 6th. Residents will also be receiving a reusable bag.

E. Dennis: The City is in the engineering stage of their 2022 Capital Projects. There will more updates as the projects continue. The City is close to bidding the 2022 Road Project, the City is also sending their plans up to the state for their approval because we are using some state grant money in its completion. Our Shore Road Project is in the Right-of-Way Easement phase with Atlantic County, it probably won't get started until the late Fall/Winter.

N. LaRotonda: Requested an update from the developer regarding Royal Farms.

E. Dennis: The only update he is able to provide is that the developer still has a valid active lease with Royal Farms. There are things happening in the background between the developer and Royal Farms that the City is not involved with. They are not included in private entity discussions.

N. LaRotonda: Asked if Royal Farms is still pursuing to come in, and any update about the developer in regard to cleaning up the site.

E. Dennis: The only other update he can provide to the public is that White Horse Liquors, which will also be on that site, is very excited to get moving.

Council President Howell: Requested an update on New York Avenue subdivision.

E. Dennis: The New York Avenue subdivision is going smoothly. There is a lot of coordination between the City and the various utilities coming into the property. The City is getting close to submitting an application to the Planning Board for County approval for a major subdivision.

Mayor Horton: Recognized a "VIP" Absecon resident (of over 70 years), Frances Adirzone, on her 100th birthday, with a prepared proclamation. In regard to the NJ Education Commissioner's recent decision to reject Absecon's petition to sever their send-receive agreement with the City of Pleasantville, Mayor Horton presents a timeline of the City's efforts to achieve the separation over the past three years. Despite the verdict, the City will continue to pursue ending it's send-receive agreement.

Council President Howell: Echoed Mayor Horton's disappointment with the NJ Education Commissioners decision. Assured the public that the City has been, and still is, working hard to sever the send-receive agreement. Mayor Horton is trying to set up a meeting between the Council and Governor Murphy regarding this matter.

PUBLIC PORTION

Motioned to open to the public: Councilman LaRotonda; Seconded: Councilwoman Cavileer
All were in favor.

C. Seher – 707 Chelsea Rd: Would Council consider passing a resolution regarding the appeal of the Education Commissioners decision. Thanks the Council for supporting and working on this matter. Claimed to attend almost every meeting the New York subdivision has been discussed and wanted clarification on the changes he's recently discovered.

E. Dennis: Asserted the changes must have been made at a meeting Seher did not attend. After discussion with New York Ave. residents, the New York Ave. ad-hoc committee (that has been helping guide the project design), it was decided to go with a compromise/hybrid option that included two cul-de-sacs.

C. Seher: Asked if these New York Ave. residents proactively meet with Dennis or did Dennis proactively meet with Residents?

E. Dennis: New York Ave. residents attended a public Council Meeting and expressed concerns they wanted to discuss so Dennis offered to meet with them.

C. Seher: Asked whether Dennis met with residents who were against the cul-de-sacs.

E. Dennis: He considered the two contrasting opinions in the ultimate design which is he previous called it a compromise/hybrid option. If you're concerned about traffic, there will be a Traffic Impact Statement submitted with the Planning Board application to the County. Dennis offered to meet with Seher if there were more specific things he wanted to see or discuss.

C. Seher: Noticed that for Closed Session, "contract negotiations" are listed. Reminded the people that if personnel is also a topic of closed session, the City is required to give out Rice Notices. Seher asked if the Meeting will open back up to the public after its Closed to describe the City's action.

B. Blaney: Advised RICE Notices were given to all. Yes, we will generally describe the action.

C. Seher: Months ago, in the matter of the Deputy Fire Chief, Bill Blaney told Seher that nobody on Council had anything to do with Dale Conover's suspension and that it was solely issued by Fire Dept. Chief Roy Talley and Police Chief Laughlin.

B. Blaney: Remembered saying that the City was not going to comment on specific individuals and that generally the City Council has not taken any action against anyone. I have not discussed anyone's personnel matters.

C. Seher: Questioned if City Council had anything to do with serving someone a suspension notice. Has heard rumors that a compromise was offered to Conover, but Council did not find it acceptable, so they gave Conover a Rice Notice.

B. Blaney: Asserted that he is unable to discuss personnel matters, especially when someone has been "Riced" and indicated that they do not want it discussed.

J. Westcoat – 115 Kessler Lane – Real Estate Agent at 410 New Jersey Avenue: Frustrated with the horrible state of the property across from her business. If a resident kept their property in that state, they would be fined, so why isn't the developer suffering any consequences? Called the site a disgrace to the Absecon community.

E. Dennis: Informed Westcoat that he did, in fact, get in touch with the developer, which is why the grass was cut.

J. Westcoat: Who is the correct person to talk to about this?

E. Dennis: There is not an engineer inspecting that site, maybe that's a discussion for Code Enforcement. Encouraged people to remember the owner of the property is the redeveloper. Perhaps Thompson or himself could talk to the developer about the site's upkeep.

T. Marrone – 1104 Spring Lane: Echoed Westcoat in his disappointment in the state of the property on White Horse Pike. Requested an update about the status of Royal Farms at the property. He has conducted his own research and has concerns about their future in Absecon. He is also frustrated that the old Firehouse was demolished in order to clear the land for the Royal Farms project.

Commander Siedlek – American Legion Post 28: Wanted to give the public an update of the Legion's plans for the next 6 months. June 25th is the Clam Bake at 7:00PM. The Legion also has another car show coming up at the Home Depot parking lot on September 27th. The Home Depot Foundation just gave the Legion a grant to replace the floor in the American Legion. The community is stepping up and helping out.

W. Link – 317 W. Church Street: Noticed an absence of prayer in Absecon's Council Meetings and requested prayer be re-instated.

W. Link: Very upset that the tree near White Horse Pike was cut down illegally and without a permit. Wants to know if whoever cut the tree down will be fined for it.

J. Thompson: A permit was not required to cut down the tree.

W. Link: It is required to have a legal tree cutting company take down the tree. So that tree was illegally taken down.

J. Thompson: There was no requirement for a permit because they owned the property and they owned the tree. Unless there was a permit we would have no way to check their contractors.

Roy Talley – 100 Howlett Lane: There is an American flag flying down at the park, which is not being taken care of. It's been unlit for over a year now. It's not in compliance with the ambient light required for an American flag. It should be maintained. It's an embarrassment to Absecon. I know the state takes care of it, but the grass isn't cut either. Wants City to have a little more pride.

Council President Howell: Where is the flag flying?

R. Talley: The state-owned park. Also, the developer on the property previously discussed asked Talley about mowing the grass, although he didn't have enough time to do it. However, Talley asked the owner about Royal Farms and it didn't sound promising.

Roger Dutch – 315 Pennsylvania Avenue: Doesn't usually come to meetings because pretty happy with operation of City, however concerned about some things he's heard and seen. I've heard that Council had claimed they weren't involved in the discipline of a firefighter, however they're discussing it in Closed Session tonight so they must be involved. This is confusing and the public wants to know what's going on. Someone earlier mentioned the City wasting money and I agree. We get grant money to create that park but isn't the upkeep our tax dollars?

Council President Howell: Asked what field Dutch was talking about.

R. Dutch: Replied the "waste of space dock."

Council President Howell: Asked if he was referring to Faunce Landing.

R. Dutch: Confirmed he was. He claimed Absecon lost parking due to the undertow and the current area "does nothing." Now, someone he's known his entire life and who has volunteered and given back to the community so much, has to worry about "liking" a comment about the Faunce Landing being a waste of tax payers dollars. It was a waste of money, and it's the residents' money being spent to correct things. It's ridiculous that the members of Council would go this far to punish someone for "liking" a comment on Facebook.

M. Reilly - 444 4th Street: Disagreed with Dutch's opinion that Faunce Landing is a "waste of money." The work done to Faunce Landing was a great improvement. Turner Cove is a bit underused. Reilly lives near Faunce Landing and sees the people come and go there. There are all different people of various races, religion, etc. who come down and go there. The problems down there come after dark when young people go down there probably drinking and partying, which is no different now than it was 50-60 years ago. The only difference now is that the area looks nice and attractive. I think it was a great improvement to the City.

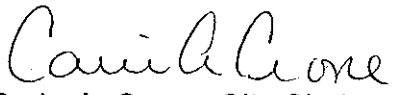
